I invited him into my counseling room. He seemed pretty relaxed as I pointed him toward the swivel rocker and handed him a cup of coffee. We small-talked a few minutes and I completed the brief Intake Form. I asked if I could pray to start the session and then asked him what we needed to talk about. He explained that he had come to see me because his girlfriend had given him an ultimatum... either he would go for coun-



seling to learn how to treat her better, or else she would leave him and go back to her husband. As his story unfolded, I learned that the girlfriend's husband was a Christian who, along with his family and friends, were praying for her to return home. The man in my office, meanwhile, seemed to have almost zero knowledge of, or experience with God or the church.

One thing seemed clear: he did not want to lose his girlfriend so he was hopeful that I would help him... that I would coach him in how to treat his girlfriend more kindly.

I gave him eye contact and nodded my head at appropriate times while listening to more details of his life, but a complaining conversation stirred in the back of my mind, disrupting my focus. "What? He came here to Abundant Living Ministries thinking that I'm going to help him in his affair, that I'm going to teach him how to love his married girl-friend better??? I don't think so! I have better things to do with my time than to get involved in such sticky messes!!!"

As I silently griped, he continued, "I may have been abused as a child but, actually, I'm not sure what really qualifies as abuse." I asked him to tell me more. He very matter-of-factly told me of sexual mistreatment at the hands of both parents, so vile I would not even consider writing it into this letter. He was calm and seemed so "untouched" by it all... as though he truly did not realize how damaging this would have been to him.

The voice in the back of my head changed its tune instantly and dramatically! Just like that, COMPASSION rose up within me. What a self-righteous man I was being. I was sitting in judgement on this man's sin when I did not have a single clue about his background, the ways he had been mistreated, or his understanding of life. This man needed to learn about Jesus' love, which was so much more important right now than him being preached to about his affair with a married woman.

It's as though I went, in a moment, from feeling harshly critical to feeling loving and kind, concerned and tender, merciful and empathetic, while wanting to do something... *anything* that would help him!

COMPASSION – something I ask the Lord for repeatedly. The Merriam Webster dictionary explains *compassion* to be a *sympathetic consciousness of the other's distress, together with a desire to alleviate it*. I like Sharon's (my wife's) explanation that COMPASSION means, literally, "to suffer together." What a tremendous help it is when a dear friend comes alongside us, in our darkest days, encouraging and supporting and praying with us!

COMPASSION – is one of the most significant traits of effective counseling! And, interestingly, it's something that every one of us Christians can experience and model. We don't have to be professional counselors or professional any-things... we can "suffer together," offering tenderness, mercy, scriptural guidance... as we do *something* that will help. It's called COMPASSION!

May we experience a COMPASSIONATE 2018!

God's love for us is not just a feeling. It is an action. He demonstrates His love with practical and sacrificial giving. His love causes Him to communicate with us through His Word and prayer and His amazing creation. His love causes Him to watch over us, protect us, listen to us, encourage us and help us. If He does all these things for us every day, how can we not choose to give our love to those in our lives via practical action. **Love reaches out in kindness!**

View your loved one from God's perspective.

Psalm 103:13-14 As a father has compassion on his children, so the Lord has compassion on those who fear him; for he knows how we are formed, he remembers that we are dust.
